With the proliferation of smartphones with video and camera capability, police officers find themselves in situations where they are being recorded by citizens with greater levels of frequency than ever before. This session begins with an examination of 1st Amendment cases which direct officers that they cannot arrest a person for exercising their First Amendment rights through speech or other conduct. Current cases will be discussed which deal with various courts' findings that an officer's decision to arrest someone was in retaliation for being recorded by a citizen in a public place. Regulating Drones in Chicago: A Template for Local Legislation: On November 18, 2015, the City of Chicago enacted a comprehensive ordinance regulating the recreational use of drones within city airspace, the first of its kind in the Nation. Cracking the Airbnb Conundrum: Creating Meaningful Short-Term Rental Regulations that Achieve Your Municipality's Regulatory Goals and Encourage Innovation.

The first part of this presentation will provide a discussion on how to draft local regulations that address Airbnb and other short-term rental companies. Your municipality has concluded its preliminary discussions and hearings and has decided to allow and regulate short-term rentals such as those facilitated by sites like Airbnb. You have now been tasked with crafting a local regulatory law. How do you ensure that your regulations accomplish your municipality's regulatory and policy goals, without being over-inclusive and stifling legitimate innovations in the short-term rental industry? In her presentation, Ms. Lizotte suggests issues to consider when drafting, and highlights some other business models that are susceptible to inclusion in many short-term rental regulations. In the second part of this presentation, Michelle Gowdy, the General Counsel for the Virginia Municipal League, will discuss Virginia's legislative efforts to deliberately supersede and preempt state and local taxation and land use laws and ordinances relating to short-term rentals/Airbnb, and to replace them with new paradigms that are unenforceable by localities. This issue may be a new trend in Airbnb's effort to eliminate a "patchwork" of local legislation. The panel will also include a discussion by Matthew Curtis, the Director of Government Relations for HomeAway.

Aging infrastructure, emerging technology, fiscal constraints and new solutions to old problems have created a platform for municipalities to use public private partnerships to perform traditional municipal functions.
